The trip was a great success and much appreciated by all that attended.

Octobers Meeting was a Trafalgar lunch. This was held at their usual venue Castle Inn, Bramber. The guest speaker was Adrian Bell, CEO of blind veterans. His experience of many years as a Royal Navy Welfare Officer showed out, by his personal introduction to each and every one of our branch assembled. A reasonably healthy 16 in number were present. Adrian Bell, previous to working in the Charity Sector which also currently includes the role of CEO of Blind Veterans UK, had the great privilege and ability to command no less than three Royal Naval Warships. Touching upon some of his Naval experiences in terms of ‘Modern History’, Adrian

included mention of a briefing held by General (U.S. Army) Tommy Franks in 2003 on the Invasion of Iraq. In typical American flamboyant style, the First Strategy Meeting was held in a theatre and opened with an excerpt from the film 'Gladiator'. Evidently General Franks criticised the action because; "It took too long and no supporting aviation!"

Returning to the celebration of Trafalgar and its relevance (even today) because of Nelson's understanding and perception of how much certain battles impact not just on one's country but has Global implications too. It is important to acknowledge what Trafalgar – and certainly Nelson the man – meant to the Navy and the country. In one sense it was the culmination of a personal feud between Nelson and Napoleon Bonaparte. The superb tactical and strategic victories achieved at the Battle of Copenhagen, the Battle of the Nile and finally, Trafalgar. It is fair to say Nelson, besides being a great Leader and Naval Tactician, had the gift of seeing 'The Bigger Picture', both operationally and the International objectives – especially those of Trade and political importance. Adrian Bell further drew comparisons with the Battle of Jutland, just over a hundred years later, between the Royal Navy's Grand Fleet and the German High Seas Fleet, the last ever Battleship versus Battleship fleet action.

Though the Branch was unable to correctly identify the Russian Baltic base in Kronstadt, that was the target of the Royal Navy with some Air Support, in its attack of 1919, we were, however, able to assist Adrian in remembering the French Admiral Darlan, in the action at Mers-el-Kebir, Algeria; a difficult decision was made to sink potential Allied/French ships to prevent their capture by the Germans, in 1940.

A most informative and thoroughly enjoyable talk was concluded by Adrian donating a bottle of excellent Port to the Branch: this had an unknown future as it disappeared for 'safekeeping' with our Chairman, Stuart. Time will tell...

A final Toast was made by Adrian Bell, repeating a revised version of the Immortal Memory of Admiral Lord Nelson but also including the Captains and Men under Nelson's Command who also fell at the Battle of Trafalgar – as originally crafted by Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Farewells were made with a promise to return next month, for our Taranto Anniversary.





Around fifty people including Mark Bowra the founder of the Bowra foundation and other FAA Association members joined the family and the Step-by-Step Challenge walkers who were covering 92 miles of the South West Coast path.



Crowds rally for stroke survivor's worthy cause

CROWDS gathered to cheer on a father-of-two who suffered a major stroke as he took part in a charity walk to raise money to help with his rehabilitation.

Sam Buckley and his family are from the Weymouth seafaring town of Poole. Sam is on a year-long journey to the pursuit of recovery from brain injury through practical help and support.

The Dorset-based charity visits Sam periodically in Poole to help him with his rehabilitation.

A walk to raise funds and awareness took place on Saturday in Weymouth, led by the charity's founder, Mark Bowra. The walk was a 10-mile 'Step-By-Step' challenge who walked from Ferndridge to the Pier and back again, with an endurance challenge covering 92 miles along the South-West Coast Path.

Sam and his family, along with supporters, walked the route supported by members of the Fleet Air Arm Association.

The group all collectively strolled down to the cafe to raise awareness for the charity: a distance of 10 miles which took around an hour.

Speaking at the walk, Dave said: "My son suffered a stroke in 2012 and we've received so much amazing support in that time and the Bowra Foundation have given us absolutely fantastic support and we're going to raise a lot more money for the charity."

"It's been a wonderful day and I really want to express my thanks to all that have supported us."

We've had a lot of old friends coming down today for the support and people have even been walking in wheelchairs as we've been walking along the Esplanade – it's been amazing."

Mark Bowra said: "We're doing the walk to raise the profile of stroke and brain injuries. We're being massively supported by us by Sam."

"Honestly, there needs to be a huge thank you for such a brilliant turnout and it's really inspiring to see."

Sam, a carpenter, came from his home in Ferndridge with his wife and two sons last September when he suddenly lost feeling down one side of his body.

He pulled over safely and called a work colleague before he was rushed by ambulance to Royal Bournemouth Hospital. Following an MRI scan, it was discovered that Sam had suffered a bleed on the brain and was taken to Southampton General Hospital for specialist treatment in the neurology unit.

Ride To The Wall (RTTW)

Two members, Ian Tate & Steve Kershaw, attended the annual RTTW on 4th October. Riding up to Tewkesbury on Friday 3rd October for an overnight stop before joining the group of around 500 riders at M5 Strensham Services, one of the twelve designated start points for the group ride to the National Memorial Arboretum (NMA). Around 5000 Motorcycles, Trikes, Scooters, one Tut Tut and a Quadbike braved Storm Amy over the weekend, unfortunately some of the riders coming from the north west and northern areas pulled out or reverted to cars as the winds were too strong for safe riding.

The RTTW Charity was set up some 18 years ago for military, ex-military, families and civilian personnel to pay their respects to the 16,000 military personnel who have lost their lives and whose names are carved on 'The Wall' since the end of WWII. The charity has raised some £1.83million for the NMA since it was established, around £173,000 was raised last year. There were around 10,000 people visiting the site and attending the Act of Remembrance Service on the Saturday undeterred by the inclement weather.

An Interview with

Fleet Air Arm Association President

Rear Admiral Tom Cunningham CBE

Q. Why did you choose the Royal Navy over the other Armed Forces?

I didn't as such as I knew very little about the UK Armed Forces.

Q. When and how did you join the navy and what made you join the FAA?

I joined in 1977 from finishing school in Ireland. I was pondering whether to go to university to study either medicine or engineering or to not attend university and seek training as a commercial pilot. However, it transpired that commercial airlines were not recruiting at that time and a school friend who had joined the RN insisted that I should try up fly with the Navy. He gave me the application form and, mainly to appease him, I completed it. Unexpectedly, within weeks I was invited to an interview at the Admiralty Interview Board, so I attended out of curiosity. Even more unexpectedly and much to my parents' shock and dismay a telegram soon arrived inviting me to join Dartmouth 6 weeks later in January 1977. Not my best planning moments!

Q. Where was your favourite Royal Navy posting and why?

It is difficult to say as many brought special moments. However, my posting as a Lynx Flight Commander in a Frigate was probably my favourite. The ship has a very strong team spirit and a somewhat 'unorthodox' approach. We had a great deployment to the Gulf and Indian Ocean for the Tanker War and were invited to undertake many unforeseen and very challenging tasks, including operating 3 Lynx off a Type 22 Frigate for a protracted period. All of these tasks were completed successfully, if again, not always in an orthodox fashion!

Q. Looking back on your Royal Navy career, what are your special memories?

I would have to say that bringing a ship back to the UK after a long challenging deployment bought very special feelings of satisfaction in that we had all returned safely having achieved much and enjoyed it. However, the most striking recollection is the result of a major inquiry into military aviation in which the FAA came out very strongly. Although this probably should not have surprised us, it was stark to see an external authority reach that conclusion. Many of the things that we had taken for granted were in fact best practice and the FAA safely delivered aviation output far more efficiently than many others. We really did routinely undertake difficult maritime tasks around the world more efficiently and as safely as anybody else.

Q. As a young person – was there any other careers that you thought of doing, Footballer, Rock star etc?

Nothing so exciting! I had thought that I would be either a doctor or a civil engineer.

Q. Do you find that having a family network at home, gave you a lot of support in life, both in your Royal Navy career and beyond?

Absolutely, my wife Sally was WRNS and understood the Navy which made sustaining a happy family life much easier. Similarly, my parents, who new nothing about the Navy, were fascinated and I think that this network of interest and support is instrumental in sustaining a professional focus.

Q. What is your proudest moment in life so far?

I was very proud to the Head of the FAA, but probably equally proud at my daughter's wedding.

Q. When did you become President of the Fleet Air Arm Association?

A long time ago , it was 2011.

Q. Why did you agree to be President of the association and what benefit do you think it has in modern society?

I knew several members of the Committee at the time and was familiar with the good work that the FAAA did across the FAA community. I do think that such associations do much to sustain our ethos even into the modern military structures. The youngsters see that the life that they are leading builds strong bonds and comradeships that last for life. Equally, non-serving people see the special relationships that are formed in the military and all of this is hugely supportive of recruiting new generations.

Q. Anything else you would like to say to the readers of this newsletter?

Only thank you for all that you do to sustain the ethos of the Fleet Air Arm we all enjoyed and congratulations on your individual part in forging the reputation that we enjoy for excellence in the field of maritime aviation.

Celebrations and Congratulations

I would like to take the time to celebrate a special gentlemen who reached his 100th birthday this year.

Although not a member of the Fleet Air Arm Association, he did serve in the Fleet Air Arm and I think it was fitting that a card was sent on behalf of the association members to wish him congratulations on this monumental achievement.

John Lansom - known to everyone as Jack – was born in Manchester on November 8th 1925.

After leaving school at 14 he worked at a builders merchants and at the age of 17 started helping with the war effort when he joined a shadow aircraft component factory in Manchester assisting with the assembly of aircraft components.

On achieving top marks in his Forces entrance exam at the end of 1943 he chose the Royal Navy and more specifically the Fleet Air Arm, perhaps influenced by his previous experience with aircraft component assembly.



After approximately 12 months of training across various disciplines he finally embarked the troop carrier Athlone Castle which set sail from Liverpool and crossed the Atlantic in convoy to eventually reach the Panama Canal and onward to Australia.

He disembarked in Sydney early in 1945 and was transferred to the Mobile Operational Airbase (M.O.A.B) at Bankstown Sydney, where as an Air Mechanic Engines (A.M.(E)) he assisted with the assembly, repair and servicing of fighter aircraft, principally the Firefly.



Like his compatriots he took up digs with a local family and continued at the MOAB throughout 1945 as the wars in Europe and the Far East came to an end.

His ultimate destination HMS Implacable arrived in Sydney in March 1946 for a refit having successfully fighting the Japanese the previous year. Jack joined the ship and it briefly sailed locally and supported the Australian Naval fighter pilots training programme for carriers until it set sail for England in May 1946.

Jack became a 'Plane 'Captain' responsible for supervising a team to carry out daily inspections on aircraft airframes, engines and electrics.

HMS Implacable sailed back to England via Ceylon (Sri Lanka) and through the Suez Canal arriving in England in June 1946. The ship briefly went on to a flying tour up to Norway and back and Jack was finally demobbed in the autumn of 1946.

Jack returned to work and had an unbroken period of employment in Manchester working as a skilled technician, working with commercial plate glass until his retirement in 1990. He married his wife Joan in 1949. He has one son David, three grandchildren and two great grandchildren and still lives independently in Manchester, having only recently stopped driving his own car. He has been a widower for nearly 40 years and retains a great interest in gardening, football and cooking. He is a great credit to his generation.



Nigel Edward Malcolm WO(Air Electrical Mechanic) BEM



Nigel Edward Malcolm BEM crossed the bar on 5th September 2025.

Born in 1954 he joined the Royal Navy in 1971. Over more than 30 years of distinguished service he worked on Wasp, Wessex, and Sea King helicopters, serving with pride across the Fleet Air Arm, Small Ships Flights and as a Junglie before retiring as a Warrant Officer in 2004.

He later continued his service with the Ministry of Defence, supporting both the Sea King and Merlin teams. Nigel was an exceptional athlete. He excelled at squash, long-distance running, and ran Field Gun, and carried his passion for sport into rugby, where he played, coached, and refereed at regional level.

He is survived by his beloved wife Julie, herself a veteran, together with their sons Andrew and Chris and their families.

Nigel will be remembered not only as the perfect Warrant Officer, professional, reliable, with an unflinching moral compass, but also as a true shipmate, friend, and loyal Fleet Air Arm Association member. He will be greatly missed. Fair winds and following seas, Nigel. Rest easy, shipmate.

department working on both the Britannia and Concorde on the latter of which he designed the jigsaw for the engine bay doors




Terence (Terry) Bullingham AEA(L) D058003Y

21st October 1944 - “Crossed the bar” 10 November 2025

Terry passed away peacefully with his wife Maria by his side.

Terry first joined the navy in 1960. In May 1982, whilst serving on HMS Antrim, during the Falklands conflict, as a Chief Petty Officer, he was hit by a cannon shell from an attacking Mirage Jet, he was severely wounded and lost his sight.

In 1982 he was referred to Blind Veterans UK (formerly St Dunstan's) where he received free support, including rehabilitation and training at their Brighton centre. Terry became an inspiration to others by becoming a speaker for Blind Veterans UK and gave talks to groups about his experiences.



He was a branch member of South Downs .

Terry's Funeral will take place on Wednesday 3rd December 1430 at Woodvale

HMS Daedalus Commemorative Stone Dedication

HMS Sultan was honoured to participate in the unveiling of a commemorative stone in June at Solent Airport marking the rich legacy of HMS Daedalus as a Royal Naval Air Station (1939 – 1996).

Their commanding Officer, Captain Mark Hamilton, represented Sultan alongside Commander Megan Ashton, highlighting the direct connection between their establishments.



Captain Hamilton said “It’s a privilege to represent HMS Sultan at this important commemoration. The legacy of HMS Daedalus lives on through the engineering training we deliver today at Sultan. The dedication and innovative spirit shown by those who served here during World War II and beyond continues to inspire our current generation of engineers and technicians.”



The ceremony featured displays from Navy Wings Charity, including the world's oldest airworthy Swordfish – a fitting tribute to the station that launched 435 sorties on D-Day and played crucial roles in operations against the Italian fleet at Taranto and the German battleship Bismarck. HMS Sultan is proud to continue the tradition of naval aviation engineering excellence that began at Daedalus.

Divisions July 2025 HMS Sultan

On 25th July 2025, David Smith, Jim Moulson and I attended divisions at HMS Sultan, to celebrate the Engineer's Passing Out Parade, where the Guest of Honour being Vice Admiral Paul Marshall CBE. The newest naval engineers and technicians had completed their world-class training and were ready to join the fleet as the 'beating heart of operational capability', maintaining, repairing and operating Royal navy ships, submarines and aircraft across the globe. The day started with a presentation of awards.

TAGA Medal

Telegraphist Air Gunners (TAGS) operated in FAA aircraft from 1922 – 1950, providing communications by morse code and manning the rear gun. 3000 TAGS were trained in the branches 28 year life span, 495 were lost through enemy action and / or flying accidents, with 69 becoming Prisoners of War. Most TAGS served for the period of WW2, before returning to their civilian occupations in 1945/1946. 1947 saw the first gathering of the TAGS out of which the Telegraphist and Air Gunners Association was born. The TAGA trophy has been used to recognise the best AE in

initial air engineering training since 1988. The winner of the TAGA Medal for the academic year 2024 – 2025 is AET Fletcher Powe.

Rhodri Leyshon Memorial Match



Lieutenant Rhodri Leyshon Royal Navy Commando Helicopter Force pilot, aged 31 died on September 4th 2024, when his Merlin Mk4 helicopter crashed into the English Channel during a training exercise off the coast of Dorset. A highly capable pilot and instructor, he was well regarded by his colleagues and superiors who described him as a “shining light”. His death prompted widespread tributes from the Royal Navy, his family and the public.

He was a keen rugby player for Cowbridge RFC as well as Wales URNU and Cardiff Met University. A team formed of serving military personnel as well as veterans with personal links to Rhod from his decade long career played against his former club Cowbridge at Cardiff Arms Park on 30 August 2025. This charity match was raising money for the Welsh Air Ambulance. A donation to help the match take place was given by the FAAA, after the AGM in May.

I was lucky enough to attend this event in Cardiff at the home of welsh rugby. The weather could have been kinder, after the summer heatwave, we had a day of heavy rain showers and gusty wind.

The evening started with a guard of honour forming up to welcome both teams out of the tunnel.



The teams were inspected by the local Mayor and other VIPS escorted by Commanding officer of HMS Cambria.



As this was happening there was a fly past by 2 Royal Navy Helicopters, that came in low and slow above the ground, and bought a tear to the most hardened veterans eyes.



Lt Cdr Will Murry (the captain of Rhod's XV) laid out the No. 7 Jersey on the ground between the two teams and the number was "Retired". A minutes silence was held, after which the match balls were delivered by Rhod's girlfriend and his

sister. The Welsh National Anthem was then played, before the “Retired Match Shirt” was collected and passed to VIP Lord Lieu and delivered to Rhods family.

The match kicked off and was very evenly fought. At halftime it was one unconverted try a piece. The second half saw Cowbridge pull ahead and the final whistle blew with the score at Cowbridge 17 Rhods XV 12.

The match was well attended, and followed by a bar-b-q and music. It was in all a very enjoyable occasion despite the weather. It was also a record breaking match, as it raised the most money at a rugby event in Wales Air Ambulance History, beating the previous record set at Wales V England Six Nations Fixture, £6000 was raised for this worthwhile cause.

National Service of Remembrance 9th November 2025

The parade sees 10,000 veterans and eligible participants march past the cenotaph annually in a National Act of Remembrance, led by HM The King. The parade forms up in columns initially on Horse Guards Parade before moving through Horse Guards Arch to form on Whitehall in time for the King to arrive at the Cenotaph.

The march past parades down Whitehall, passing the Cenotaph, before turning right on Great George Street and right again on Horse Guards Road where the salute is taken by a member of the Royal Family. All columns are then reformed on Horse Guards Parade, following which the National Anthem is played, and the parade is dismissed.

This parade provides the nation with a physical reminder of all those who have served and sacrificed, with British and Commonwealth soldiers, sailors, airmen and women represented, together with members of the emergency services and civilians, ensuring that no-one is forgotten.

The Fleet Air Arm Association was represented this year with 19 of its members attending the march.



Once the parade had been dismissed they made their way to the Fleet Air Arm Memorial on embankment , and were met with family and other members, to hold a wreath laying ceremony at the memorial.

The ceremony was well attended, and there were a few 'tots of rum' taken with shipmates that they hadn't seen for a while and in memory of those who have 'crossed the bar'.

New scheme to help service personnel transition to jobs in boarding schools

The UK's largest boarding school network has launched a new scheme to help service personnel work in the sector.

The BSA (Boarding Schools' Association), which has more than 400 UK independent and state member schools, has launched ASPIRE (Accredited Service Personnel into Residential Education).

ASPIRE offers a training and induction pathway for serving or former service personnel to explore roles in boarding. Through the scheme, applicants will receive a range of benefits, including:

- Interview to assess suitability to work in boarding
- Online training: introduction to boarding in 2025
- A day's training on boarding schools, roles, regulations and safeguarding (next running on November 27, 2025)
- An induction visit to a BSA member school
- CV and application support
- Promotion of candidacy to BSA member schools
- Affiliate membership of the BSA's Accredited Boarding Practitioner scheme
- Affiliate membership of BSA's sister association for boarding staff, TIOB (The Institute of Boarding)
- An accreditation certificate.

Commenting on ASPIRE, Dale Wilkins, BSA's Executive Director for Accredited Training, said: "While traditionally roles in boarding have been held by teachers, there is increasing recognition of the many relevant skills, attributes and experience service personnel offer.

"Boarding schools can be a very attractive second career for service personnel, from working in boarding houses to helping with sport, the Duke of Edinburgh Award or cadets, or indeed other roles.

"We believe our new ASPIRE scheme can offer an offer a pathway between talented candidates and schools looking for new boarding talent."

Alex Foreman, Principal, Duke of York Royal Military School, said: "Supporting ex-service personnel into boarding roles is a win-win. Students will benefit enormously from the resilience and life experience of participants, who will in turn embark upon a fulfilling career mentoring and nurturing young people."

The ASPIRE programme is currently available at an introductory price of £750.

An Individual Resettlement Training Costs (IRTC) grant of up to £534 may be available to those who have served within the last two years and completed six years of full-time service (or less if medically discharged or made redundant).
